Strategic Plan:

The Air Force Association Strategic Plan for 2007 – 2010 sets the direction for the Association and updates and builds upon the AFA 2006-2009 Strategic Plan. This plan was formulated with the Aerospace Education Foundation (AEF) as the educational affiliate of AFA and operating under a separate, but similar Strategic Plan. The new Plan recognizes the merging of AFA and AEF into a single entity in April 2006. The combined AFA and AEF Mission, Vision, Values are now reflected in this single document. The elected officers of the Association, the President and key members of the professional staff developed the AFA Strategic Plan with the assistance of the Strategic Planning Committee (SPC).

Education:

The activities of the Association are not necessarily restricted to a single mission area or, as discussed later, a single theme; in fact most of the activities of the Association at the national and field level meet goals and objectives which are synergistic between the mission areas of Educate, Advocate and Support. This is especially true in as we consider our role in “Educating the Public”

Aerospace Education Programs

Aerospace Education Program Overview

- **Visions of Exploration**, a joint effort with USA Today newspaper and local Air Force Association Chapters, provides elementary, middle and high school teachers across the nation with a curriculum to enhance student understanding and appreciation for math and science, and to sharpen their critical and strategic thinking skills. Approximately 1,200 classrooms benefit from this program each year.

Ways to Use

- Develop partnership with local services (Power Company, Corporations, etc) for assistance w/ costs
- Send feedback (written report, newspaper article) to AFA to be submitted to AFA Magazine
- Give participating teachers recognition with a certificate or small token at PTA meeting
- Contact local USA Today representative for (additional) classroom contacts and support
- Co-sponsor a Teacher's Workshop or In-Service presentation with USA Today and CAP representatives

- **Teacher Recognition Programs** honor outstanding teachers, promote excellence in the field, and encourage aerospace instructional activities. Each year, we conduct a national search for our National Aerospace Teacher of the Year. We also recognize local teachers throughout the nation.

Ways to Use

- Present multiple Chapter Teacher of the Year awards (i.e. one to a teacher in each school in the area)
- Recognize at State/Chapter function & in classroom/school
- Get Community Partner to co-sponsor AFA & CAP Aerospace Education Memberships
- Send feedback (written report, newspaper article) to AFA to be submitted to AFA Magazine
- Sponsor Fellowship to honor winner; get a co-sponsor as Partner to defray expense

- **Scholarships for Air Force Spouses** provide six (6) \$2,500 scholarships in 2009 to spouses of Air Force active duty, Air National Guard and Air Force Reserve members. Military spouses face unique difficulties in completing their education — frequent moves, overseas duty, isolated locations and the special hardships associated with the rigors of military life. These scholarships ease the burden of completing an education.

- Recognize at State/Chapter function
- Contact Base Education Office to help promote recognition on base
- Sponsor Fellowship to honor winner and present at AFA event OR at an appropriate event on the base
- Send feedback (written report, newspaper article) to AFA to be submitted to AFA Magazine
- Invite recipient to participate in Chapter or State Executive Committee for the year

- **The Jodi Callahan Memorial Scholarship** was first awarded in 1997, and the three (3) \$1,000 scholarships goes to active duty, full-time guard or reserve (officer or enlisted) members who are working towards a Master's degree in a non-technical field.

Ways to Use

- Recognize at State/Chapter function
- Contact Base Education Office to help promote recognition on base
- Sponsor Fellowship to honor winner and present at AFA event OR at an appropriate event on the base

- Send feedback (written report, newspaper article) to AFA to be submitted to AFA Magazine
- Invite recipient to participate in Chapter or State Executive Committee for the year

- **Pitsenbarger Award Program** gives a one-time educational grant to selected Air Force enlisted people each year. These grants assist young enlisted members in completing their college education.

Ways to Use

- Volunteer to participate in selection process
- Help fund graduation ceremony
- Attend and assist in presentation at CCAF Graduation (script is provided by AEF)
- Contact Base Education Office to help promote recognition on base
- Recognize at State/Chapter function
- Send congratulatory letters to family members

- **Educator Grants** to teachers nationwide for an aerospace activity to assist in teaching science, technology, engineering and math in the classroom. Teachers use these grants for field trips, to purchase textbooks, software, videos, simulators and other instructional aids.

Ways to Use

- Contact Vision Classroom teachers and invite them to apply
- Recognize at State/Chapter function & in classroom/school/ school board or PTA meeting
- Invite to be on State/Chapter Executive Committee, etc
- Get a community organization (Community Partner or other organization) to Partner with the Chapter and match the AFA grant
- Give the educator an AFA membership
- Contact USA Today & CAP local representatives to help identify educators to tell about the program
- Send feedback (written report, newspaper article) to AFA to be submitted to AFA Magazine

- **Chapter Matching Grants** to AFA chapters to assist in establishing aerospace education programs to benefit their local communities. These grants are given, matching the expenditures of the local AFA chapter. Chapters use these grants to fund science fairs, teacher education, and stay-in-school programs.

Ways to Use

- Send feedback (written report, newspaper article) to AFA to be submitted to AFA Magazine
- Get a Community Partner or develop a new Partnership to support the program and increase funding capability (e.g., project is \$2,000; chapter and partner combined provide the \$1,000; AFA Matching the other \$1000).

- **AFJROTC Instructor Grants** enable AFJROTC instructors to expand the aerospace and civics experiences in this growing educational program.

Ways to Use

- Recognize at State/Chapter function & at School Board or PTA meeting
- Invite to be on State/Chapter Executive Committee, etc.
- Give an AFA membership
- Contact the instructor to offer support/assistance

- **Civil Air Patrol Unit Grants** provide CAP cadet squadrons with a source of funding for new and innovative programs expanding the benefits of their aerospace education.

Ways to Use

- Recognize at State/Chapter/school board or PTA function & at CAP event
 - Invite to be on State/Chapter Executive Committee, etc.
- **Awards for Aerospace Education Excellence** are presented each year to AFA chapters and members that promote aerospace education in the local community.

Raising Funds to Support Programs

SUBJECT: Aerospace Education Liaison Program for AFA Chapter/State

In 1986, we established the Aerospace Education Vice President (AEVP) program, which makes AFA state and chapter aerospace education vice presidents the primary point of contact for AE programs.

Aerospace Education programs directly support AFA state and chapter outreach efforts. It is through the liaison with the chapter and state aerospace education vice presidents that we are able to deliver programs to support the Air Force family. AEVP's serve the AFA mission by disseminating information within their local communities; by supporting local aerospace education programs; by seeking support for local programs through matching grants; and -- perhaps most important -- by communicating their aerospace education needs to the AFA Officers, Directors and staff to ensure that our programs are responsive to Air Force Association local needs.

PURPOSE:

- Ensure AE programs support the needs of local AFA Aerospace Education initiatives.

PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

- Establish viable communications with all State/Chapter AEVPs.
- Facilitate the flow of AE Program information, data, and program support to the AFA AE Vice Presidents.
- Coordinate and work with the National Officers and Staff to insure AE programs are viable and can be effectively used by AFA State and Chapter Aerospace Education programs.
- Provide new ideas, projects and events as needed or requested.
- Assist State/Chapter AEVP at the request of National and State Officers.
- Review and make recommendations for appropriate organizational and functional structure for the AEVP and Aerospace Education programs at Chapter, State and Region levels.

PROGRAM

- Develop and implement an effective expanded communications process.
- Understand and disseminate information in support of AE programs.
- Provide one-on-one liaison with AEVPs through meetings during AFA state and regional workshops.

ACTION

- If you have not appointed a Vice President for Aerospace Education, we encourage each chapter or state organization to do so. Please advise AFA Headquarters of your selection.

H.H. Arnold Fellowship - \$5,000 contribution

Established in 2003 to honor General H. (Hap) Arnold and his leadership in the formation of both the Air Force and the Air Force Association. In the summer of 1945, Arnold was focused on the three million AAF veterans who would be returning to civilian life and began laying the groundwork for an organization that would not only “keep the gang together,” as he put it, but also work effectively on behalf of airpower. Being named an Arnold Fellow honors those with the same spirit of support for those who serve.

General Bernard A. Schriever Fellow - \$2500 contribution

Established in 2000 to honor General Schriever and other leaders who, like General Schriever, have created an Air Force Space Program that is second to none in the world. General Schriever--regarded by most historians as the father of the Air Force's missile and space program--gave his all to the space race and, through his personal example and leadership, inspired generations of military leaders, as well as their civilian counterparts. The honoree receives a lucite pyramid containing a minted coin honoring General Schriever.

Jimmy Doolittle Educational Fellow - \$1,000 contribution

The Jimmy Doolittle Educational Fellow honors the late General Jimmy Doolittle who, actively promoted public understanding and support for aerospace power. The honoree receives a personalized walnut plaque which houses a specially minted coin honoring General Doolittle.

Ira Eaker Historical Fellow - \$1,000 contribution

The Ira Eaker Historical Fellow honors General Ira Eaker and his leadership in inspiring widespread appreciation of the significance of our vital aerospace history, and its role in our national security and the contributions our aerospace achievements have made to the betterment of mankind. Being named an Eaker Fellow honors those who have the same spirit of promoting aerospace power. The honoree receives a personalized certificate and spinner containing a replica of General Eaker's Congressional Medal of Honor.

Fellows and Associate Fellows of the Association

Established in 1995 to recognize outstanding contributions to aerospace education.

Fellow of the Association - \$500 contribution

The award includes a special certificate and a leather bound copy of *Crusade for Airpower* by James H. Straubel signed by various Chiefs and Secretaries of the Air Force.

Associate Fellow of the Association - \$250 contribution

The award includes a special certificate and a copy of *Crusade for Airpower* by James H. Straubel.

Scott Associate - \$50 contribution

Established in 1978 by Walter E. Scott to recognize dedicated individuals who support the AFA missions. The honoree receives a personalized certificate and a wood grain plaque.

Visions of Exploration

Background on Visions

Visions is a cooperative program between the USA TODAY Education, AFA chapters, and AFA national to encourage the skills necessary for success in math and science among the nation's elementary, middle and high school students. In academic year 2007-2008, the program was in 1,293 classrooms. For 18 weeks, each class receives a teacher's lesson plan and 30 newspapers that gives children practical examples of science and technology and possibly inspires them to desire aerospace careers. Many chapters get involved in mentoring with the classes, holding special events and awarding the special Certificates of Accomplishment to each student who participates.

CHAPTERS CAN REGISTER AT THE AEROSPACE EDUCATION FOUNDATION'S WEB SITE AT <http://www.afa.org/visionsdefault.asp>. If the chapter does not have access to the Internet, your local USA TODAY representative will help you register. Both AFA and USA TODAY will receive a copy of your registration. Once we know how many classes you are willing to sponsor, AFA will invoice you for the correct amount.

- There is only one registration period per school year. Registrations are due no later than October 30, 2009.
- Cost this year to AFA Chapters during the 2008-2009 school year is either \$94 or \$100 per classroom.

Many ways to use Visions

- You can work with your local USA TODAY representative to encourage placement in a team teaching environment. This means several teachers share the program in their various subject areas exposing even greater numbers of classes to Visions. The Visions curriculum is designed to be interdisciplinary, used in all core subject areas and need national educational standards
- Work with your Community Partners and chapter members to sponsor a class. We are offering a special incentive for first-time chapters participating in Visions of Exploration. If your chapter did not participate in Visions during the 2007-2008 school year, AFA will pay 60% of the cost for the first 5 classrooms you sponsor which brings the cost per classroom down to \$76 per classroom.
- Volunteer to have an AFA representative speak on a career in aviation.

Added Benefits with Visions

- **Visions of Exploration Teacher Guide.** This product provides 18 additional lessons highlighting the best science articles from the past year, and published in USA Today newspaper. Teachers also

have access online to the traditional Visions teacher's guides and "Explorer" student guides.

- **Lesson Guides.** Access to a special web site at www.education.usatoday.com is available for teachers, students, parents and local chapters. Visions teachers can enter a password-protected area for *Experience Today*, a daily lesson plan to use with USA TODAY as well as additional teaching activities based on today's news and the link to career education. Online, students can also participate in several learning activities. If a teacher does not have access to the internet, they will receive a printed copy of the lesson material with the mailed newspaper packet.
- **Certificate of Accomplishment for Visions Students.** USA TODAY has designed special certificates for chapters to present to each student who completes the Visions program. Most chapters contact the schools and find out when they will be finishing the program, possibly arrange a time when they can go to the school and have an AFA representative present the certificates to the students. Jodi Callahan Memorial Scholarship Guidelines

Objective

The Captain Jodi Callahan Memorial Scholarship provides a \$1,000 scholarship to an active duty Air Force, full time Air National Guard or full time Air Force Reserve (officer or enlisted) pursuing a Master's Degree in a non-technical field of study.

Requirements/Selection Criteria

Completed application packages must be postmarked no later than June 30, 2009.

- A completed application form
- One letter of recommendation from your Air Force supervisor or commander which includes a character reference, a description of your performance and an assessment of your potential as an Air Force leader and volunteer
- If you have not begun your advanced degree, submit proof of acceptance into a Master's program at an accredited college or university. This must be on college or university letterhead and state your name and date of your first term of attendance.

Spouse Scholarship Guidelines

Objective

The Air Force Spouse Scholarship program is designed to encourage Air Force Spouses worldwide to pursue associate, bachelor or graduate/postgraduate degrees. The number and amount of scholarships awarded depends on available funding and on the number of qualified applicants.

Requirements/Evaluation Criteria

- The applicant must be a spouse of Air Force active duty, Air National Guard or Air Force Reserve to be eligible. Spouses who are themselves Air Force personnel, or in ROTC, are not eligible.
- Include an original of your college/university transcript from the 2008-2009 school year verifying your minimum 3.5 cumulative GPA or higher. The transcript must have your name on it and show that you are enrolled for the minimum number of hours (6 credit hours for undergraduate study and 3 credit hours for graduate study).
- Include proof of acceptance to an accredited college or university. This may consist of a short letter on college or university stationery from the admissions office or the registrar. A receipt for payment of tuition of the Spring 2009 term is also acceptable.
- In a two page double-spaced essay, describe your academic and career goals and the motivation which led you to this decision. Describe how Air Force involvement or local community activities in which are you are involved will enhance your goals.
- Two letters of recommendation should be character references and descriptions of your performance and potential as a student, employee or volunteer. The two letters must be from different sources. The letters can be from professors, employers or volunteer organizations. You may also request a letter from your local AFA Chapter.
- A feedback form will be sent to recipients with their scholarship check and is required to be returned not more than six months after the award is made.

Civil Air Patrol Unit Grant
